



#### Forestry & Estate Maintenance Update from Head Forester

After one of the driest summers in recent years, the Estate's woodlands have moved into November with a strong, if somewhat brief, show of autumn colour. Whilst the dry conditions may not have been ideal for tree growth, this autumn has seen an abundance of seeds in what is known as a mast year. Beech and oak trees across the Park and woodlands have produced a bumper crop of nuts and acorns, promoted by the dry spring, which will have aided pollination and development of the seeds.

A bumper seed crop has numerous benefits for birds and foraging mammals, whilst also providing a valuable source of natural regeneration in the woodlands. After a highly productive winter period for timber harvesting, work has been ongoing over the summer to prepare the felled areas for replanting and to locally scarify some of the soils to improve the potential for this year's seeds and those already in the ground to germinate.

Whilst the dry weather has not been ideal for tree growth, it has allowed the continuation of timber harvesting work with minimal impact on the soils, including clearance of brash and branches as wood chip in addition to the normal range of milling timber, firewood and associated forest products.

Our dedicated in-house Forestry and Maintenance team, along with local contractors, have also made good use of the summer conditions in an extensive programme of improvements to the Estate's infrastructure, which has seen significant upgrades to fences, walls and also the roads around the Park and surrounding areas. As we enter winter, we continue to work on Estate upkeep, improving the resilience of forestry tracks for timber harvesting, and preparing new areas for planting to support biodiversity into the future. As November arrives, our attention turns to the cutting and replanting of Christmas trees.

#### **Bowlees Barn Restoration**

Raby Estate has recently completed the restoration of an iconic barn near Bowlees in Upper Teesdale. This was with the support from Durham County Council on behalf of the North Pennines National Landscape Partnership. The estate team have carried out structural repairs and fully restored the building back to its former glory.

The building will now be used as it was originally intended for and provide storage and shelter for livestock.



## **Keverstone Grange Farmhouse**

This property has received new timber windows and doors, a new bathroom, oak flooring refinished, a new septic tank, redecoration and carpets.

The refurbishment is now complete with a new tenant found within a week, and is now let.

#### **Hunt Hall**

Hunt Hall is undergoing a full refurbishment, the property is currently being stripped back to its bare stone walls and completely refitted including a layout change and an addition of an extra bathroom. The property will be rewired, fully re-piped and new heating system installed. This will form a new inglenook stove opening, new kitchen and utility room, fully insulated external walls, new windows and external doors, full house of new interior woodwork, redecoration and carpets.



Raby Homes are delighted to introduce the East Leaze development of new homes at Staindrop, County Durham.

East Leaze takes its name following research into the history of the area in the archives at Raby Castle.

The earliest surviving map of this area dates from 1732 and names the area where the development will be placed as East Leaze. We thought it a respectful nod to the past to use this name whilst also looking forward to an exciting new chapter in local history. New homes in this location will support existing services within Staindrop village and will contribute towards meeting the housing requirements of the County. Over recent decades, we have seen amenities such as shops and pubs lost in many of our villages. New housing will bring more spend to Staindrop to help it thrive – supporting schools and local services. The scheme will deliver high-quality housing (including affordable housing), along with the enhancement of public and open spaces.

The design for the scheme was created by Ben Pentreath, one of the country's leading architectural practices involved in the design of traditionally inspired new developments. Their work seeks to draw from the best of the past, making places that are human scaled, timeless and long-lasting, and yet robustly designed for modern life. We are excited to share news about East Leaze as it develops.





#### A Farming Update from the Farm Manager

What a fantastic autumn we have had at Raby Home Farm. The combination of a strong team, favourable weather, and the addition of a used Horsch Sprinter Direct Drill, as well as the Horsch Avatar purchased three years ago, has made a real difference to the autumn drilling this year. The drilling season progressed like clockwork, and the crops are an absolute pleasure to look at. We have adopted widespread companion crops, winter cover crops and winter bird food crops. The focus on soil health over the past 5 years really has started to pay dividends. I have rarely seen so many acres of land with so near-perfect soil conditions.

After a couple of challenging autumns and a dry summer, it is really satisfying to see the soil in such good condition. Not only does the soil look physically well, but it has also been scientifically measured inhouse with a massive amount of help from Durham University. The results have been textbook. It makes me realise all the attention to detail and hard work from the team really have been worthwhile, and a big thank you to Durham University. I am also looking forward to the Soil Mesofauna course at Durham University in November. I am sure there will be some key take-home messages for the farm team. I feel the right training is so important to keep the farm progressive. Jack (our main drill operator) certainly enjoyed his direct drill training day. It is pleasing to see the level of skill he now has, guided by our foreman, the farm team are exceptional. How many farm teams try to establish species as diverse as yellow rattle, vetches, linseeds, millets, as well as the usual combinable crops? We never have a dull moment!

The cattle have done well this summer, though the lack of grass has caused concern. We are hoping to lift the fodder beet soon to ease the pressure on our winter forage stocks. The Tups have gone to the ewes, so we are just about to start the sheep cycle all over again. We had an insight into how the sheep can be integrated into the arable operation recently, with store lambs grazing the summer cover crops before winter beans were sown. As soon as the lambs adjusted to the change of diet, their growth rate increased dramatically. Although hard work during a busy time, it has worked out well. I hope some of the forward cereal crops will also be grazed, both for animal and crop health reasons.

#### Departmental Update

### Black Grouse Translocation

Raby has participated in a recent Black Grouse Translocation project orchestrated by The Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust and funded by Natural Englands Species recovery Fund. The project had two main aims – to understand more about the species especially maternal/brood foraging habits and secondly to translocate 20 birds from their stronghold in the North Pennines to locations in the North York Moors where they were once widespread. The donor and recipient sites were selected on the basis of good stable donor populations and recipient locations that were able to provide the habitat and management practices to support the species.

In 2024, 10 males and 10 females were caught from a number of locations in the North Pennines and re-released. A number of these birds were radio tagged to aid the research project. Raby have been one of the main donors of birds into the translocation project. Black Grouse are a symbol of Raby, they are an iconic North Pennines bird and a barometer of conservation efforts carried out by the Estate, our tenants, partner organisations and our neighbours.

We are pleased to report that the first year of the project has been a resounding success, the translocated males established a number of Leks, the iconic breeding ritual that has not been seen in the North York Moors in living memory. All of the female birds attempted nesting and for the first time in over 180 years black grouse successfully bred in the North York Moors with the successful fledging of chicks.

We work very closely with the GWCT in counting and monitoring black grouse populations on the Estate and establishing their annual success. We hold very long term data on the species which is really important when dealing with any species or habitat.

Following a very successful 2025 breeding season for Black Grouse on the Estate, the Estate will be donating a further batch of birds to the project with the second release designed to bolster that of the first and cement the success of the North York Moors Colony.

We will monitor the project closely and hope to bring you more updates on its continued success.

### **High Nature Value Farming Awards**

The High Nature Value Farming Awards is in its third year, recognising the great work taking place on farms across Teesdale and Swaledale. Working with farmers and land managers is an integral part of the Tees-Swale programme, and it is these farmers that were celebrated in the 2025 Tees-Swale: Naturally Connected High Nature Value Farming Awards.

Tees-Swale: Naturally Connected is funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund with thanks to The National Lottery players, including providing the £500 for the gold award winners.

The High Nature Value Farming Award, highlights farms which have consistently shown best practice in looking after the land, and protecting important habitats and species. Two Raby tenants have won key awards at this year's event.

Richard Wearmouth, Middle End Farm, is the High Nature Value Farming Award gold winner, recognising long-term low intensity management and protecting nature and the natural environment.

The Nature Recovery Category, recognises farms that have transformed the way they are managed, turning them into a place where nature has a chance to thrive.

Edwin Wood, Woodside Farm, wins the gold award winner in the Nature Recovery Category for his commitment to restoring field boundaries on the farm and enhancing other areas for wildlife.

### Raby Castle to open for new Christmas Experience for the first time in 50 years

Raby Castle will be opening its doors during the festive period for the first time in five decades to show the castle decorated for Christmas, designed by custodian and creative director, Lady Barnard.

This will be a chance for visitors to experience how the Vane family enjoyed Christmas at the Castle and see the rooms beautifully decorated as they would have been in the past, with the family's traditional gifts, flowers and sumptuous Christmas trees.

The journey will take visitors through eight rooms on the ground floor, telling the story of Christmas Day at the castle, from the early morning thrill of opening a Christmas stocking to an evening of elegant dining and Christmas games, featuring an impressive table setting ready for a spectacular festive meal.

Raby Castle, Park and Garden's recent development, known as 'The Rising' won in the Georgian Group Architectural Awards for the reuse of a Georgian Building.

Part of 'The Rising' included a magnificent suite of 18th-century equestrian buildings which have been fully restored as part of a wider regeneration project. Over the last two years, three beautiful buildings have been given a future. The Grade II\* listed Coach House and Stables by John Carr of York, originally housing carriage horses, carriages and grooms' accommodation, had latterly become a small café and shop. The Riding School used to provide cover for events in inclement weather. Finally, the Grade II\* listed Dutch Barn, a hidden architectural gem, has been restored after falling out of use over recent years.

All three buildings have been sympathetically renovated and repurposed by the Raby workforce supported by specialist consultants and contractors, to high standards, using appropriate materials from locally-sourced slate to salvaged estate stonework.

To achieve this, the Raby in-house team was expanded under the supervision of experienced heritage building specialists. Full roof and fabric repairs, new flooring, including areas of underfloor heating drawing from local ground-sourced heat, careful interior design, and landscaping in the surrounding area using largely local reclaimed materials have created three public-facing spaces at the heart of a transformed visitor experience. Built for the Earls of Darlington, keen horsemen, hunters, race-horse breeders and trainers, these buildings have been placed into their historic context and can now be shared with visitors.

The new collaboration will be hosted within The Conservatory in Raby's Walled Gardens, where Deborah Simpson Boston, a floral designer and owner of Periwinkle Barn, has worked with Raby's team of experts to create a beautifully designed flower pop-up shop.

The retail space, featuring seasonal bouquets, tools and books about gardening and floristry, will be within the central space of The Conservatory, alongside an exhibition area detailing the history of Raby's 18<sup>th</sup> century Walled Gardens and a space where Deborah will host a series of workshops on selected dates.

Deborah said: "Everything is so beautiful and well thought out here at Raby – it really is a dream place to work with its calming and soothing atmosphere. I hosted workshops at Raby Castle in the summer which was a fantastic introduction and I'm really looking forward to my ongoing residency here for the next few months. The winter period will bring seasonal workshops including wreath making, tablescapes and so much more."

Deborah returned to the Durham countryside after studying and working in Brighton and London and has been growing delicate and romantic stems from her 400-year-old barn since 2022. She has over ten years of experience in event flowers and created the flower display for the 2025 Royal Maundy Service at Durham Cathedral, which was attended by His Majesty King Charles III and Queen Camilla. With a passion for British flowers, sustainability is also a keen focus for Deborah at Periwinkle Barn. She said: "I've made the conscious decision to work as sustainably as possible, growing and using seasonal British stems from spring to autumn. From late autumn to winter, I source stems which are as sustainable as possible without chemicals or pesticides.

"My ethos closely aligns with Raby's – there's a wonderful synergy between us both and it's brilliant to work with likeminded people."


